It is important for me to observe and learn. I have met so many who are involved in parish life and I hope to meet more formally with the various groups in the coming weeks. I am also glad to say "welcome" to anyone else who would like to be involved.

After spending most of my life teaching and working in the area of liturgy, this remains of particular interest and importance. I have been part of our Sunday and weekday worship, celebrated Funeral Masses, the Service of Light with the boys and girls who will be confirmed on 10 April, 'Do this in memory of me' with the First Communion classes, Baptism this Sunday, and continuing our Lenten journey to Easter. I am observing with great interest and appreciation the contribution of so many to our liturgy. I am aware of some of the story of the seating. That proposal was made, of course, in a time frame that was radically changed with the much earlier than expected change involving Fr Jim and myself. I need time to review the situation while at the same time noting the way we use the totality of our worship space. In the end it is about the worship of God.

**When**? Tues, 15 April at 7.50 p.m. **Where**? St Columba's Church, Joha Koad **Why?** As Christians, we know that many of our traditions are rooted in the Jewish faith, with its high point, the celebration of Passover, which allows each generation of Jews to relive their history and make the story their own. Jews and Christians can remember and share the momentous events of God's call and redemption. The Seder meal, as the ritual meal of Passover is called, is the opportunity to remember the experience of a people enslaved and then redeemed when God brought them to freedom and to see so many links with our Christian faith and worship. It also reminds us of the many people today who are enslaved and seek freedom.

The Seder meal will include all the Seder symbolic foods and their explanation and end with a two course dinner. The text we use is one published by the archdiocese of Chicago in association with the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith and will observe the Passover dietary restrictions, for example, eating only unleavened bread or matza and the normal restrictions about not having milk or dairy products in the same place. The Seder meal does not include Mass.

Booking forms will be available this week and an early return of forms is advised as there is a limit on the numbers we can cater for.
