Reflection: There is a lot of anxiety around at the present moment, a lot of it caused by uncertainty. We are so used to setting dates in our calendars and diaries for events, certain that they will come to pass on that date. Coronavirus has upset all that and revealed to us that we are not as in control of events as we like to think. Climate change, itself caused by human behaviour, has been trying to warn us of the same fact, though not yet as suddenly or dramatically as the Coronavirus. Weddings, Baptisms, First Communions have all had to be postponed, and now students don't know if they will be sitting the Leaving Cert this year or not. Other people are awaiting results of a test or the rescheduling of an appointment for a medical procedure which has been postponed. The not-knowing seems to be the worst aspect, and this is what gives rise to so much anxiety and

distress. Maybe in such situations, all we can do is hand over our powerlessness to God and entrust our concerns to him. 'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God still, and trust in me. (John 14:1)

In today's Second Reading, St. Peter reminds us that, at a time of confusion and darkness for many, believers have a profound dignity and a call to be the light of God's compassion and solidarity for those who are suffering.

'You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a consecrated nation, a people set apart to sing the praises of God, who called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.'

May is usually a busy month in the life of the parish as we celebrate First Holy Communion for the boys and girls from the St Columba's girls, St Vincent's Boys and Lindsay Rd school. We share their disappointment, and that of their families, that for the moment these celebration have had to be put on hold but we look forward to the time when both schools and churches will reopen and we will be able to set new dates for these celebrations.

As the first phase of the government reopening of the country begins on Monday 18th May, and conscious that everyone is now permitted to take a daily walk, we hope to begin reopening the church on a limited basis so that parishioners can drop in briefly to say a prayer or light a candle.




