Reflection

The first recorded words of Jesus in John's Gospel are a question: 'What do you want?' Were we to put that question to people today we might get a variety of answers: to be able to visit family and friends again, to be able to go back to school or to our place of work, to be able to attend Mass in person, to get the vaccine, to be under less pressure working in a hospital or nursing home setting, not to get sick, to be able to play sport again. These are all a response to our current situation, where so much of our normal activity and social life is curtailed and we are asked to stay at home for the sake of the wellbeing of all. But the question Jesus asks is at a deeper level. Beyond our current needs or sense of dissatisfaction or frustration, what are we really looking for in life? What do we hunger for deep down: love, acceptance, hope, purpose, a sense of God, forgiveness...? When Andrew and the other disciple respond to Jesus question by saying, 'Rabbi, where do you live?' they sense that Jesus has something life-giving to offer them and they want to get to know him more.

The report of the Commission of Investigation into Mother and Baby Homes presents a litany of appalling suffering over several decades of thousands of vulnerable young women and their babies at the hands of both church and state. The stories may be painful to listen to, but it is very important for the survivors that they feel heard, acknowledged, believed, and vindicated in their search for truth and justice. We can only pray that the publication of the report and the unequivocal apologies by both church and state bodies may serve as a necessary first step on the way towards healing and closure.


The first reading and the gospel today are about God reaching out and calling us by our name through others. God is always trying to contact us and connect with us.....
