


OUR PARISH SHOP is open on Sunday mornings. It is a cash based system.

Our Church Calendar

In the days when every kitchen had on display what we called a 'Church Calendar', several things would catch our eye this week.

Pentecost, the word is Greek for 50, and our feast is the 50th day and end of the season of **Easter**, with the coming of the Holy Spirit. Some times and in the past called Whit or white, this might have referred to the new gift of the Spirit or to the colour of dress of the baptised or of the vestments used on that day. There is also the Jewish feast of **Shavout**, originally a thanksgiving for the wheat harvest but observed as the commemoration of the giving of the Torah, the Law, at Mount Sinai. Also called the **Feast of Weeks**, it is seven weeks after the Passover, celebrated on the following day, the 50th.

The next day, Monday after Pentecost, is the memorial of the **Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church**. It is a new feast, established by Pope Francis in 2018, but an old title of Mary, the Mother of God. The gospel of the day is of Jesus on the cross entrusting Mary to his disciples as their mother, they are her children. St Augustine wrote of Mary as the mother of the members of Christ and St Leo the Great wrote of the Mother of Christ and mother of the members of his Mystical Body, which is the Church. **Pope and Saint, Paul VI** declared Mary as the Mother of the Church in 1964. His memorial is 29 May but not celebrated this year since it is also the Monday after Pentecost.

We then move into Ordinary Time but yet, as we proclaimed at the Easter Vigil, all time belongs to Christ, yesterday and today, the Beginning and the End, the Alpha and the Omega. No time is just ordinary!

Wednesday next is the feast of the **Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary**, to Elizabeth. Thursday is the memorial of **St Justin**, martyred in Rome around 165. He gives us a marvellous description of Sunday Mass, from around the year 150. Saturday next is the feast of our diocesan patron, **Kevin of Glendalough**.
