As we pray for a new beginning for the Church in the Archdiocese, and encourage renewed and active participation of all parishioners, please continue to support your priests in all the ordinary ways, and through this

Summer Dues collection. The generosity that people show towards their priests is indispensable; our gratitude can never be fully expressed. Your donations may go further at no additional cost to you due to the availability of tax relief on charitable donations. With your help the parish can claim a tax refund to the value of 45% of your contribution from Revenue from those who contribute €250 or more in any given year, subject to the taxpayer having paid at least the amount of tax being claimed by the parish. The parish can reclaim the tax no matter whether vou are either PAYE or Self-Assessed. This tax rebate from Revenue is now an important source of income for the parish.

OUR PATRON SAINTS			September

Last week on the 9 June, the day he died in 597, we celebrated our Parish Patron, St Columba, Born in Gartan, Co. Donegal on 7 December 521, he studied at the great monasteries of Movillle, under St Finnian, at Clonard, under another St Finnian and in our area of Glasnevin, in the

monastery of St Mobhí. He founded monasteries in Derry, Durrown, Kells , and above all, Iona. From there he converted many to Christianity, including Northumbria. Sometimes there is an obvious reason for the patronage as it was the birthplace of the saint, or where they died, or where they were active; in our case where the saint spent time as a student., becoming a monk and great missionary. But it may also be a very tenuous or unknown link. Today, countries, cities, and all sorts of places have their patrons, as well as activities, professions and occupations, all sorts of causes, conditions and illnesses, communities and individuals.

People have their favourite saints and they become their protectors on earth and advocates in heaven. Most of the patron saints are probably not known at all. For example, every illness has its patron. To help us through a flu season, we have the archangel Raphael, whose name means 'God heals us' and many others, including St Luke, who was a doctor, St Blaise, invoked especially against ailments of the throat, St Vitus, again, a martyr -the neurological disorder in children Sydenham chorea is also called St Vitus's Dance. Because of this name, he is also patron of dancers and actors. Gereon, died a martyr at beginning of 4th century, can be invoked against headaches -he was beheaded! Agathius of Cappadoccia may also be invoked -he, too, died a martyr by beheading. And St Teresa of Avila, who suffered with migraines.
